

President's Message

Something Old, Something New

It is time to announce the Indiana Gourd Society's spring festival and membership meeting. All members and vendors are invited to the June 15 event at the Tippecanoe County Fairgrounds, 1010 Teal Road, Lafayette, IN, 47905, 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. The Theme is "It's a Gourd, Gourd World." Free admission! Free parking is available.

Everyone is asked to bring up to 15 items to exhibit for competition. There will be plenty of tables and chairs that are stored in the Home Economics Building, where the event will be

held. The items may be old or new, but I am especially interested in seeing SOMETHING OLD such as some great pieces that may have been exhibited years ago and thus have been ineligible to again be in competition at the state show. If all 15 of your entries are in the dried gourd division, that is acceptable, or you may have 4 dried and 11 birdhouses (functional arts & crafts). The rules are entirely different from those at our usual competitions. It is, however, perfectly acceptable and desirable to bring SOMETHING NEW and to display your current projects.

The divisions will be as

follows: dried, botanicals, floral design, arts & crafts, functional arts & crafts, and children (up to age 18). These divisions are the same as the state show except we shall comingle divisions 4 and 6 and exclude galleries and groups/schools. There will not be classes of competition pieces, just broad divisions. The goal is to have as large a competition as possible with minimal fuss, since it is a six-hour exhibit!

In addition, will those of you with some Jim Story pieces please bring them for display in a special area? If we know what we have available, I am thinking that at next year's show we could feature Jim's gourds near the video we display and market. If you cannot bring the piece(s) to Lafayette, would you send/bring a photo of pieces you would be willing to display next May 1-4 (2014) in Lebanon?

Another SOMETHING OLD request is to please bring your oldest gourd. People continue to ask me, "How long will gourds last?" - we know they have been found in Egyptian tombs. I plan to bring to exhibit a gourd from our Thorntown Heritage Museum. It has a handwritten tag that says it is an onion gourd grown in 1943. Does anyone have one that is older? Please bring for display.

There is still time to produce a theme gourd

for It's a Gourd, Gourd World". Crank up those Dremel tools, wood burners, and paint brushes. It is time for some speed gourding to be ready for June 15.

There is no charge for vendor booth space at the spring festival, but we are asking for a donated item for the 1:00 p.m. auction. Bill Freihofer, by popular demand, will return as auctioneer though he tried very hard at the state show to get fired or impeached. He will again be assisted by Diane "Vanna" Werblo. Guy and Lois Shutt are hoping to pay a visit during the festival.

Food will be available 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

There will be a state show wrap-up meeting.

Setup will be 7-9 a.m. There will be gourd seeds and plants for sale. Vendors who provide gourd art, tools, and a kid's patch are scheduled for this event. Special demonstrations will be provided by the following artists:

Pyrography by Ron Bair
Zentangle by Emily Dillard
Weaving by Mac McCrary

Wax crayon art by Pat Moore (class available for a fee)

A membership meeting will be at 3 p.m., and it will include elections and discussion of fall festival and state show plans as well

as the Indiana State Fair exhibition.

Deadline for entries in the Indiana State Fair exhibit is July 1. The cost to enter up to 250 entries in the horticulture building is \$30 (if entering online), \$35 if submitting paper form. The late fee for entries July 2-30 is an additional \$25. Last year I asked at the office and learned that it is acceptable to enter as families, but that does mean that only that one name will be on the entries. For example, Sue, Dan and Julie Smith may enter as Smith Family Gourds, but all tags will say Sue Smith, Smith Family Gourds. For most of us, the name recognition may be less important than increasing the size of the State Fair gourd display, so I am encouraging the family entry by July 1. Entries may be taken to the horticulture building from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., Wed., July 31 and on Thurs, Aug 1, from 9 a.m. to midnight. www.in.gov/statefair will let you get to the online competition book and entry forms. Entries will be released on August 18 and 19. However, between August 2 and 18 we are seeking volunteers to be at the booth, answer questions, and demonstrate gourd decorating, tools, etc. In return, volunteers receive free admission passes. Let's grow this show—it needs a great influx of additional blood. More information will be available soon. My primary reason to bring the subject to your attention in June is to allow us all to meet the July 1 deadline for entries.

Watch for information regarding the fall festival and membership meeting. The festival will be October 26, 9-3:00, and we will be joined by wood carvers at the Lake County Fairgrounds in Crown Point, IN.

The gourds are growing, the air is warming, and it is time to celebrate that for IGS members and friends; it is indeed a gourd, gourd world!


Roll of Honor 2013
