Sugar Creek and Thorn Tree Gourd Patches (Karen Niemeyer, contact)

Both patches meet at the Thorntown Public Library, 124 N. Market St., Thorntown, and welcome new participants. Masks are recommended and social distancing is practiced. At all sessions participants are encouraged to BYOP: Bring Your Own Projects. On October 6 and October 20 the patches worked on finishing projects including decoupage bowls and "Down on the Farm" projects for the May state gourd show. Gourd Memories

My first memory of gourds goes back to the 1960s in Bedford, Indiana, where I grew up. My Grandmother Richardson loved gourds and displayed ornamentals every fall on the dining room table-and left them there until Christmas decorations went up. One year, she put the dry gourds into a sack and took them out back to the concrete incinerator where we burned trash. When the fire started, the gourds exploded and seeds went everywhere. The next spring, Grandma had gourds growing up the trunks of two pear trees in the back yard—my sister Jane and I can still remember the wonder of those gourds appearing everywhere! Not sure how the seeds took hold and lay dormant until the growing season--but conditions must somehow have been exactly right to make the glory crop a reality. I wish we had taken a picture of that scene 50+ years ago, but the mind picture is still sharp.

We have received several boxes of two of Aurelia Conway's gourd books: *Gourd Purses, Decorative Painting* and *How to Paint a Gourd*. We are selling these in Ways & Means, see that section for details. While she wrote these several years ago the content is relevant and useful.

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We're In Trouble!

I've been analyzing our expenses and income and find we have a serious money flow problem. We are depleting our money reserves by about \$2000 to \$3000 per year. At this rate, we will not be able to fund putting on our State Gourd Show in a few years. So what caused this and what can we do to fix it? All costs have risen in the last few years, we all know that. We've been continually losing membership. We have certain expenses that must be paid, like insurance (to be able to have a booth at the state fair), *Tendril* printing/ postage, storage facility (for our state show materials), and other ongoing expenses. Our dues were raised from \$10/member household per year to \$15 in July, 2006. That is a long time in today's world to stay at the same rate. I've been able to cut our insurance costs by going with a different agency. We are looking at ways to cut our storage expenses.

Here is a breakdown of some of the higher cost items:	
Insurance: \$500/year or	\$3.47 per member household
Storage: \$1410/year or	\$9.79 per member household
Total Tendril Cost: \$780/year or	\$5.42 per member household
(Tendril Printing \$540/year, Postage \$240/year;	
Electronic: \$0/year)	
Total Show Book/Workshops Flier/Postage:	\$12.40 per member household
(Show Book Printing \$1000/year, Postage \$130;	
Flier \$550, Postage \$105/year)	
TOTAL COST	\$31.08 per member household

We all know dues are \$15/member household per year (or \$40 for three years). So for every member household we are losing over \$15 per year on just these items.

How do we fix this so the society survives? Several ideas have been proposed. The board would like to get your opinion. You may like one or more of these, or do you have a better idea; let us know.

Option 1: Raise dues, perhaps to \$18 or \$20 per household per year (Three-year would go to \$50/year)
Option 2: Raise dues, perhaps to \$18 or \$20 per household per year, no three-year option
Option 3: Keep current dues structure and institute a surcharge of \$5 or \$10/year per household for printed delivery of the *Tendril*. This may have to be adjusted as printing/postages costs go up.
Option 4: What is your solution?

From the Archives: Drying and Harvesting Gourds

Ornamental, soft-shelled gourds are ready to harvest when the tendril next to the gourd turns brown or the stems are dry and brown. Ornamentals are often picked prior to being fully mature and used for fall displays. If harvested early and not mature, these soft-shelled gourds may develop wrinkled skins and rot. When the gourds rattle [dry], you can paint or polish them with products used for finishing wood. Ornamental make excellent holiday ornaments or add interest to wreaths.

Hard-shell gourds require 110 to 150 days of warm weather to fully mature. They should be left on the vine as long as there is life in the vine. They must be cured. Since gourds are over 90% water, it may take several months for a large gourd to dehydrate. I wait till after hard frost in central Indiana to harvest my hard-shells.

Freezing temperatures do not hurt mature gourds. If the gourds wrinkle up, this indicates an immature gourd. One can leave gourds outside to dry or use an attic or garage. The outer skin will mold, rot, and begin to peel as the gourd dries. DO NOT THROW AWAY THE MOLDY GOURD. After the fruit [gourd] has dried, scrape off the outer skin remaining to reveal the hard permanent shell below the grime. Soak dried gourds in water for a few minutes and wash/scrape. Use of a plastic scrubbing pad works for removing most of the mold. The mold patches may have discolored the shell but this can be painted over or use a clear finish to enhance the appearance. Remember any wood finishing product can be used on a dried gourd.

From the Archives: So Your Gourds Rotted—Or Did They?

You may have thrown out gourds that seemed to be spoiled when they became covered with mold. Next time, wait ... mold is just a sign the gourds are drying out. They are just getting ready for future use.

Freshly harvested gourds are about 90% water. When they lose that water, they dry with a tough, durable shell. But in the process of drying, your gourds will probably get moldy, and be generally unfit for human company. But don't throw them away, just handle them gently and put them in a dry, out-of-the-way place but not in a basement, attached garage, or attic, due to mold spores getting into furnace ductwork and that's not healthy for any of us.

If you want, you can wipe off the excess mold now and then; if a gourd shrivels, then toss it out, since that one really has spoiled; but if only molded, just have patience. It can take months for a good sized gourd to dry out. When they are very light (the seeds may rattle), let them soak for a while in warm water, and you'll find that the outer skin and mold will come off fairly easily with an ordinary kitchen scrubbing pad. Beneath that moldy exterior, you'll find a beautiful gourd! After it's dry, it's ready for furniture polish or paint; it can be carved or wood burned; or anything you like. With just a little furniture polish, the gourd is an object of beauty.

If you grow your own, the easiest way to cure gourds is to just leave them outside on the trellis to freeze in cold areas of the country; or put them on a rack where they can freeze and have air circulate around them. When dry spring days come, most of the skin loosens and cleaning is easy. However, the designs created by the mold will be missing and the seeds will not germinate well.
